The activities can be completed at your own pace and there are links to extra videos and resources if you want to dive deeper into certain topics.

WHO IS THE PLN COURSE FOR?

This PLN Teacher Challenge course can help you whether you:

- Are a classroom teacher, a specialist teacher, a school leader, or work in any area of education.
- Have students of your own or are not currently teaching.
- Are very tech savvy or only have basic computer skills.
- Are a pre-service teacher, qualified teacher, or even a retired teacher.

This optional workbook will help to keep you on track and focused as you work through the 7 steps.

7 STEPS TO SUCCESS

We've broken this PLN Teacher Challenge course down into 7 steps.

If you've got the time, you can work through each step over a period of hours or days. Alternatively, you can work at a slower pace; perhaps completing one step each week while allowing time to fully digest each topic.

The following overview may help you pick and choose if you only want to complete certain parts of the course.

STEP 1: What is a PLN?

The first step unpacks the definition of a PLN and connected educator. You'll learn why educators create their own PLNs and how they use them.

STEP 2: Making connections

In this second step you'll explore tips and tools for becoming a networked teacher and making connections.

STEP 3: Using Twitter to build your PLN

Onto the specifics! We look at Twitter which is the number one service many teachers use to build their PLNs and connect with other educators around the world. You'll find out what the fuss around Twitter is all about!

STEP 4: All about hashtags and Twitter chats

You'll dive deeper into Twitter, looking at how educators use Twitter chats and hashtags to learn and connect.

STEP 5: Using blogs as part of your PLN

This step explains how educators consume or create blogs to connect with their PLN.

STEP 6: Using curation tools as a connected educator

Next, you'll learn about a simple framework you can use to get started with content curation. You'll get the chance to explore a range of different tools that connected educators use for curation.

STEP 7: Making time to build your PLN

The final step brings all the learning together and looks at ways that you can find time to build your PLN. We leave you with 7 tips for success!

STEP 3: USING TWITTER

Twitter Cheat Sheet de Sheet





RETWEET (RT): A Tweet you share publicly with your $\rlap{\rlap{$\psi$}}$ followers. Adding your own comment is optional.



REPLY: Respond to another person's tweet publicly by clicking the reply icon under a tweet.



MENTION: Type the @ symbol before a username when addressing someone.



An update with up to 280 characters and possibly media (images, GIF, video).





HASHTAG: Used to index keywords or topics on Twitter. Hashtags use the # symbol.



FOLLOWING: Subscribing to someone's tweets and seeing them in your home timeline.






DIRECT MESSAGE (DM): A private message sent to someone who is following you (or a group of people).
